East Ayrshire Health and Social Care Partnership (EAHSCP)

'Voice of the Infant' event focuses on listening to East Ayrshire's young children In March we held our 'Voice of the Infant' Development Day event, which focused on listening to and prioritising the needs and rights of young children in East Ayrshire.

The event, which took place in Auchinleck's Boswell Centre, was well attended by child care and social work practitioners as well as staff specialising in early education, health visiting and children's mental health.

Sina Currie, Senior Nurse Manager for Children's Services, opened the day's proceedings by highlighting the key principles of our GIRFEC model (Getting It Right For Every Child) and our commitment to the wellbeing of infants and young children as outlined in The Promise.

Sina emphasised the duty of all practitioners to take the needs and rights of infants and young children into account at all times: "Infants' experiences, needs and rights must inform

care planning, decision making and service delivery. We must ensure we're making decisions based on the needs of our babies and young children."

Attendees were joined via video link by Laura Lundy, Co-Director of the Centre of Children's Rights and founder of the Lundy Model of Infant Participation, to discuss key aspects of the model and the nuances in the way young children may choose to communicate their needs.

Julie Drummond and Leah Cronin from the NHS Ayrshire and Arran Infant Mental Health Team also discussed the impact of early relationships on a child's sense of self, and the importance of keeping a child informed during periods of uncertainty and change.

Sir Alexander Fleming Centre celebrates ten years

The Sir Alexander Fleming Centre in Kilmarnock recently celebrated its 10th anniversary with a 'Conversation and Celebration' event involving coffee, cake, singing and reminiscing.

Guests included Councillor Lillian Jones, Council Chief Executive Eddie Fraser and Craig McArthur, Director of East Ayrshire Health and Social Care Partnership. All took part in the festivities and enjoyed seeing photos reflecting many of the activities and events that have taken place at the centre over the last decade.

The centre provides a range of on-site and community-based activities for people with learning disabilities.

Craig McArthur said: "I was delighted to help staff and service users mark such a milestone occasion in the centre's history, which is a testament to the difference it has made and continues to make in the local community. I wish them every success for the future and am sure the next decade will be even brighter."

Maureen Millar, Day Services Manager at the centre, said: "The 'Conversation and Celebration' of ten years at the Sir Alexander Fleming Centre was incredible and surpassed anything I could have imagined. The fabulous comments from everyone and just seeing people having fun, sharing stories and laughter, as well as having time to look back and reflect on events and memories of the past ten years was a joy.

"The success was down to everyone involved, not only on the day but in the planning and lead up to it. I want to thank everyone involved from the bottom of my heart. Here's to the next ten years!"

Medals all round for seniors at East Ayrshire's care home games

There was no need for a ticket to Paris to catch some Olympian feats this year as residents from across East Ayrshire took part in the Senior Care Home Games, right here in Kilmarnock.

A total of 16 teams representing East Ayrshire care homes participated in six sporting events, tallying points to decide who the overall winner was. Archery, volleyball, golf putting, football darts, boccia and a basketball shootout tested the unwavering determination of the athletes, but it was Glebe House who took gold, with Thorntoun Estate and Burnfoot House joining them on the podium.

A rained-off cycling event didn't dampen spirits as laughter and cheers raised the roof of the Ayrshire Athletics Arena. Competitors marched between rounds to The Proclaimers' 500 Miles, and SL33 and Music Box made sure everyone was singing and dancing during their breaks.

The Senior Care Home Games is organised by Scottish Care and East Ayrshire Health and Social Care Partnership's allied health professionals, with support from The Killie Community,

Scottish Archery, East Ayrshire Council's Vibrant Communities and East Ayrshire Advocacy Services.

Participants where from Glebe House, Thorntoun Estate, Burnfoot House, Argyll House, Burnbank House and Doonbank House, Bute House, Glennie House, Crossgate, Springhill, Hallhouse, Torrance Lodge, Graceland, Grange, Dalmellington, Howard House and Craigie care homes, all of whom took home medals to show friends and family.

Arlene Bunton, East Ayrshire Independent Sector Lead at Scottish Care, spoke of the event's success and its many benefits for care home residents:

"This is the second year we have run the Senior Olympics in East Ayrshire, and we are immensely proud of all care home residents and staff who attend, participate and enjoy these games. The level of competitiveness between our older adults is quite remarkable to see!

"We all know how much physical activity and social engagement can benefit both our physical and mental health and these games demonstrate this perfectly. The feedback from care home managers was that their competitors returned home with a sense of pride and accomplishment. Long may the games continue!"

Digital Support Workers help tackle data poverty

Congratulations to our Digital Health and Care Support Workers (DHCSW), who recently became members of the National Digital Inclusion Network following the success of their project in the Irvine Valley community.

For almost a year, our DHCSWs have been tackling data poverty and digital exclusion by issuing SIM cards to people on low incomes and supporting them to access the National Databank.

Since July 2023 they have also been empowering Irvine Valley residents to feel more confident when using digital health and care supports, such as ordering repeat prescriptions online, using the online GP consultation app (eConsult), accessing the NHS Near Me website and using other health monitoring apps and digital tools.

Their weekly 'Smart Hub' drop-in at Ross Court Resource Centre has given the community a place to find help and support with a range of technology, as have their 'Cuppa TEC' groups and 'TEC backpack' demonstrations.

Following its success, it is hoped the project will soon expand to other areas in East Ayrshire.

DHCSW, Haylee Brogan, said: "We are really excited to help support people to get digitally connected through our data bank scheme."

Coffee morning invites community to share their views

Visitors to East Ayrshire Community Hospital were invited for coffee, cake and a chat at our recent What Matters To You Day coffee morning.

The event, which coincided with What Matters To You Day on Thursday 6 June, invited the local community to share what matters most to them in health and social care and to take part in our Strategic Plan review consultation.

It was lovely to see so many people stopping by for a blether and to find out more about the partnership and some of our partner organisations.

Shortlees Social brings local practitioners together

Practitioners in health, social care and education were invited to network and share ideas at the inaugural Shortlees Social event.

Hosted by East Ayrshire Vibrant Communities, What Matters To You and the EAHSCP HEART team, the event aimed to strengthen community ties and foster collaboration among local practitioners.

Held in the Community Garden of Shortlees on Friday 21 June, the event was a significant step towards building and nurturing relationships across various sectors.

Bringing together colleagues from a variety of services, as well as East Ayrshire Health and Social Care Partnership, this diverse gathering aimed to encourage informal interactions in a relaxed setting.

The day was a true celebration of community spirit, with a BBQ, outdoor games and a friendly atmosphere. Attendees had the opportunity to unwind, engage in conversations and participate in activities which helped break down professional barriers.

By providing a space for practitioners to get to know each other outside their formal roles, the Shortlees Social helped build trust and understanding, both of which are essential for effective teamworking and service delivery.

The success of the inaugural Shortlees Social paves the way for future events which will further strengthen the network of professionals dedicated to serving the East Ayrshire community.

East Ayrshire Vibrant Communities, What Matters To You and our HEART team look forward to organising these events to ensure a more connected and supportive environment for all.

The Shortlees Social is testament to the power of community engagement and the positive impact it can have on local practitioners and the people who use their services.

East Ayrshire flies the flag at Scotland's first pride event for older people During National Pride month, Kilmarnock hosted Silver Pride, the first event of its kind in Scotland celebrating older members of the LGBTQ+ community.



The event took place on 27 June at the Park Hotel and was attended by 180 community members, of whom approximately 100 were older adults from across the community, including care homes.

The National Lottery funded event brought together guest speakers, information stalls, artwork, balloons and entertainment, transforming the day into a cultural celebration and informative occasion.

As older people are now feeling more confident in sharing their identities, we are beginning to see a rise in residents who do not identify as heterosexual coming into the care sector looking for support.

Arlene Bunton, East Ayrshire's Independent Sector Lead at Scottish Care, explained why establishing such an event is important:

"We are finding that more people who have benefited from the more accepting and inclusive attitudes we now have are entering their older years. Our Silver Pride event has been the perfect opportunity to raise awareness of the needs of those identifying as LGBTQ+ who access services, and particularly those with dementia who identify as LGBTQ+.

"In addition to today's event, our funding will provide training across the independent sector as well as to social work and social care staff to help them support individuals and their families, and to help them manage the reactions of other care home residents. We want all older adults to live as their authentic selves."

The lasting message from the event and training will be 'You are Safe with Us', emblazoned on a pin badge presented to staff who attend to demonstrate their support of inclusivity.

Young artists to showcase work at Paisley exhibition

A group of care-experienced young artists from East Ayrshire have been invited to participate in 'The Big Art Show' in Paisley.

The event, hosted by Outspoken Arts, will take place in 'The Art Department' venue in Paisley town centre. With an ethos of inclusion, the event will give rise to entries from a wide range of ages, stages and artistic abilities.

The invitation comes following a series of recent success from the ArtClub? Collective, a group of care-experienced young people in East Ayrshire who share a passion for contemporary art.

This is a fantastic opportunity for our care-experienced young artists. In recent weeks ArtClub? have devised their own artists' brief to give their work and output a coherence and themes, while enabling them to express themselves individually as well as collectively.

Inspired by the theme of 'Nostalgia', which the ArtClub? chose themselves, club member Emma Kasper put together an artists' brief from various sessions which captured views and ideas from the group. This co-curated approach is key to how the club operates.

Led by Promise Participation Lead, Eòghann MacColl, ArtClub? runs in partnership with the East Ayrshire Leisure Trust, whose exhibitions have been inspiring and thought provoking to group members.

Eòghann said: "ArtClub? is part of the participation work we do to enable the voices of our care-experienced young people through consistent engagement and a safe space for dialogue, whether art related or not. We greatly value our partnership with East Ayrshire Leisure for making the ArtClub? group possible.

"We aim to build confidence and provide hope and have seen some changes and wee victories coming out of this work as well as showcasing the great creativity of our young people. Being able to raise their voices at the Big Art Show is a real acknowledgment of their presence and being present."
